

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT: Court Ramsay

To: Personnel

From: Court Ramsay

Subject: S.T.E.P into Action!

Dear Personnel,

Today we had our monthly System Task Evaluation Process (STEP) review and I'm proud to offer some of our statistics and details of our discussions. Before I get into the numbers and what they mean though, I want to say that by in large the fleet has embraced this safety process. Many crews are offering detailed and honest results in conjunction with thoughtful JSEA's. It's not 100% though, and I want those crews that may be doing some "Pencil whipping" to reengage and deliver results that I know everyone can. Now with the numbers:

To date, 3,811 STEP's have been conducted by Aries crews on our vessels over the course of seven (7) years! Congratulations! This is a huge accomplishment. You have helped measure the effectiveness of Aries Marine's Safety Management System at the Point of OPERATION. I emphasize Point of Operation because most systems measure effectiveness historically. We do it in Real Time. No one else does this, and is why our safety record is so strong and the envy of many. Last month alone 73 separate tasks were evaluated in coordination with our JSEA process.

Speaking of JSEA's, since we started this program, you have completed and Management has reviewed 15,186 JSEA's! 664 JSEA's have been completed in just the first quarter of this year! With the average team size for a JSEA completion of 2.14 crew members, it's proof positive that Aries has a very tight safety culture - to the point that even vessel maintenance is seen as an important activity in which to engage in hazard mitigation. You see, a lot of vessel companies are guilty of believing that the integration of only large teams rises to the level of risk to do their JSA. Of course, you can see the mistake in this - an accident can happen with one person doing a task just as quickly as many people doing something in unison.

Our Guidance Document usage hovers around the 99% mark. On rare occasions crew members may believe that either a Guidance Document does not exist or is not specific enough for a particular task. And, this may be the case in rare instances but I challenge you all to not let specific circumstances void the general details of a common hazard. For instance, electrical shock is a hazard in anything that is powered by the ship's generators or shore power, not just small tools. Together, we have developed 200 separate Guidance Documents and it is interesting but most of the tasks

identified as not having a Guidance Document are general vessel maintenance tasks, things like changing out light fixtures, and the like. Not to say that more may be developed but I think we are close to having a complete reference system. As for the average of Hazards and Controls identified, 4.98 hazards per task were identified for the 1st Quarter and 13.10 Controls were selected which brings the controls selected to over two (2). This is going in the right direction but trust me, there are generally more than two (2) controls per hazard that can be listed. Think of things like 1) Experience 2) Training 3) Supervision 4) WOP, and 5) Safety Memos, as additional controls.

In closing, the STEP in conjunction with JSEA's and our Observation Cards are excellent ways to identify, communicate, and control hazards in the maritime space. The key is to communicate the hazard to others - "If you see it, you own it." Don't be shy or complacent; continue to be vigilant with SWA's. Many tasks being done are not classic SIMOPS but they are happening while other activities are going on, so they do represent elevated hazards. Each month, we receive some very well thought out documents and some including critical SWA's. This is the cornerstone to our SMS. Just last month, a safety suggestion was recorded between a third-party rigger and one of our own crew members; this is superb integration of our processes and proves out a mature working safety culture! Yes, the process takes more time and can be awkward, especially with customers and 3rd parties that are unfamiliar but the extra time to analyze and discuss brings everyone together on the same page and ensures everyone gets home safe at the end of their hitch. Keep up the great work!



Dedication

DWIGHT S. "BO" RAMSAY

Aries Marine Corporation and Lafayette has lost an American hero, community icon and original Wildcatter. Dwight S. "Bo" Ramsay, member of St. Barnabas Episcopal Church, died on May 19, 2022, at the age of 94, with family beside him. Dwight S. "Bo" Ramsay was born February 13, 1928, in Fordyce, AR to Anice Love Banks, Mother, and John Allison Ramsay, Father. Bo Ramsay graduated from Pine Bluff High School. In 1945 upon graduation, he entered Henderson State College in Pine Bluff. After a year at Henderson, though, he wanted to honor his older brother Banks, an aviator lost in combat, and joined the U.S. Army under the G.I. Bill. While being shipped to Japan, WWII ended with the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki but he completed his tour of duty by joining the 11th Airborne to become a paratrooper. Following a return back to the States and a military furlough, Ramsay earned a B.S. in Geology from the University of Arkansas and was then sent to Korea in 1952, to complete two tours as 1st Lieutenant in a regimental tank company of the 40th California Infantry Division. Heartbreak Ridge was where he fought with valor in close combat and earned a Purple Heart. After service, Ramsay began his career in the oil and gas business working on drilling rigs in Arkansas, Wyoming and Montana. Years later cutting his teeth as a junior Geologist and working for companies such as Vickers Petroleum, Standard Oil and Gas, and Alco Oil and Gas he moved to Lafayette to become President of Alco Oil & Gas. A merger shortly thereafter

gave Ramsay the opportunity to go on his own and become an independent geologist, free to cut deals with whomever.

With that flexibility, a rather big discovery in South Texas earned him the ability to make further investments and he chose the marine service industry forming Aries Marine Corporation, a 41 year old business still operating today with family management. In addition, the golf course he helped build in Carencro, Farm d' Allie Golf Club, known locally as The Farm, continues to operate under family management. A partial membership of professional and civic organizations include: Founding member of the Board of Directors to Southwest National Bank of Lafayette, Advisory Board Member of Iberia Bank, Chamber of Commerce, Krewe of Gabriel, National Ocean Industries Association. Offshore Marine Service Association, Lafayette Geological Society, American Association of Petroleum Geologists and Society of Independent Professional Earth Scientists. Because of his extensive industry involvement, he was honored as LAGCOE "LOOEY" in 2011. Paul ard, the founder of Badger Oil Corporation, recounts, "Bo and I met in the 1960's under adverse circumstances; we participated in a joint dry hole. Thereafter, we were strictly social friends sharing mutual interests in our community, particularly in elementary education. Bo was goodnatured, as he had to be to endure the jibes of his many friends. He was one of the few men I've known who made the transition from geologist searching for oil and gas to the operator of a business servicing the oil and gas industry. His family and our community are the poorer for his passing."


Ramsay was a consummate optimist, loved the joi de vivre of Acadiana and invested heavily into the Foundation, Special Olympics, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Episcopal School of Acadiana (ESA), Moncus Park, and many many more. In 2012, he was honored with the Civic Cup. Said Bob Lowe, a recent recipient himself, "When all the history books are put together, we are going to find out that Bo Ramsay was one of the most significant people to ever live in this community." As a philanthropist, Ramsay had few equals and his keen observations pinpointed and responded to the exact needs of worthy causes across the spectrum of religious and secular charities. Taking a particular interest in Secondary Education, Ramsay gave generously to Public, Protestant and Catholic schools, alike benefitting children throughout our community. It is ESA, however, that stands out as a jewel beneficiary in Ramsay's legacy. As one of the founders, he was instrumental in the school's early and continued success. "Beyond Bo being a personal role model and mentor to me, without his leadership and vision to establish an Episcopal School of the highest caliber and national reputation right here in Acadiana, ESA would not exist," says Paul Baker, Headmaster of ESA. And continuing explains, "very last conversation I had with Bo was about how we (as a community) can

encourage and recognize the next generation of civic leaders. He was a giant whose strong yet gentle leadership will be evident for many years to come and the trees he planted here will provide shade for generations." RAMSAY loved hunting and fishing and enjoyed destination trips to different parts of the World to sample cultures and sports.

Also, a fervent supporter of his beloved Razorbacks he traveled to football games regularly but also enjoyed ULL and LSU games – just as long as they weren't against one of his Arkansas teams! RAMSAY is survived by his beloved wife of 17 years, Geraldine Boustany; his brother, Ward Jennings Ramsay; his two children, son, Courtney B. Ramsay and wife Kylie of Lafayette and daughter, Allison Ramsay Banks, also of Lafayette; grandchildren, Calvin Bayne Ramsay of Austin, Elsa Leigh Ramsay of Savannah and Abigail Claire Ramsay of Lafayette, and numerous dear nieces, nephews and friends. He is preceded in death by his parents; his brother, Wendell Banks Ramsay and his sister, Frances Joy Williams and his adored first wife of 43 years, Betty Pfankuch Ramsay.

Aries Marine Corporation, a privately held Louisiana Corporation, was formed in early 1981 by Dwight S. Ramsay to own and operate self-elevating workboats and supply vessels in the Gulf of Mexico. Today, the fleet serves oil and gas, geo technical, industrial and offshore wind energy in both the Gulf of Mexico and East Coast Atlantic region.

The self-elevating work boats, also called Liftboats or Jack-Ups, provide mobile yet stable work platforms, crane capabilities and living accommodations for work crews performing services to various offshore and near coastal needs. The Liftboats range in leg length from 130' to 215', and are capable of operating in maximum water depths of 175'.

Primarily associated with drilling operations and industrial requirements, the supply vessels provide Aries with a diverse business mix within the marine industry. Our OSV's, as they are commonly called, or PSV's (Platform Supply Vessels) are the delivery trucks of the offshore sector. Our OSV vessels are 220', all of which are dynamic positioning.

Currently, there are 20 vessels in the fleet.

Because of our diverse fleet, Aries has worked for all of the major oil and gas producers as well as most of the independents and is active within the offshore wind space. We have established a top reputation due to all Aries operations being conducted by experienced, safety minded personnel. Aries Marine takes pride in the cleanliness of its vessels, the efficiency of its operations and our excellent safety record.

Aries Marine is headquartered in Lafayette, Louisiana and maintains a Mid-Atlantic Office out of Cape May, New Jersey.
